We Rest

Identity, contentment, praise, kingdom of God

Genesis 2:1-4

So the creation of the heavens and the earth and everything in them was completed. ² On the seventh day God had finished his work of creation, so he rested from all his work. ³ And God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy, because it was the day when he rested from all his work of creation.

⁴ This is the account of the creation of the heavens and the earth.

Sabbath (stop, rest) \rightarrow Shalom (peace, wholeness)

Exodus 31:12-17

¹² The Lord then gave these instructions to Moses: ¹³ "Tell the people of Israel: 'Be careful to keep my Sabbath day, for the Sabbath is a sign of the covenant between me and you from generation to generation. It is given so you may know that I am the Lord, who makes you holy. ¹⁴ You must keep the Sabbath day, for it is a holy day for you. Anyone who desecrates it must be put to death; anyone who works on that day will be cut off from the community. ¹⁵ You have six days each week for your ordinary work, but the seventh day must be a Sabbath day of complete rest, a holy day dedicated to the Lord. Anyone who works on the Sabbath must be put to death. ¹⁶





The people of Israel must keep the Sabbath day by observing it from generation to generation. This is a covenant obligation for all time. ¹⁷ It is a permanent sign of my covenant with the people of Israel. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, but on the seventh day he stopped working and was refreshed.' "

Living toward the kingdom of God vs. living **in** the kingdom of God. You are a **human being**, NOT a human doing.

Stillness. Silence. Solitude. Slow. Prayer. People. Peace. Perspective. Fasting. Thanksgiving. Enjoyment. Celebration. Communion. Contemplation. Reading. Kingdom of God. Love of God.

Jesus and rest: Strict observance vs. no observance

Matthew 11:28-30

²⁸ Then Jesus said, "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle at heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

³⁰ For my yoke is easy to bear, and the burden I give you is light."
